Felicitating recovered Severely & Moderately Acute Malnourished children in Andheri, Mumbai



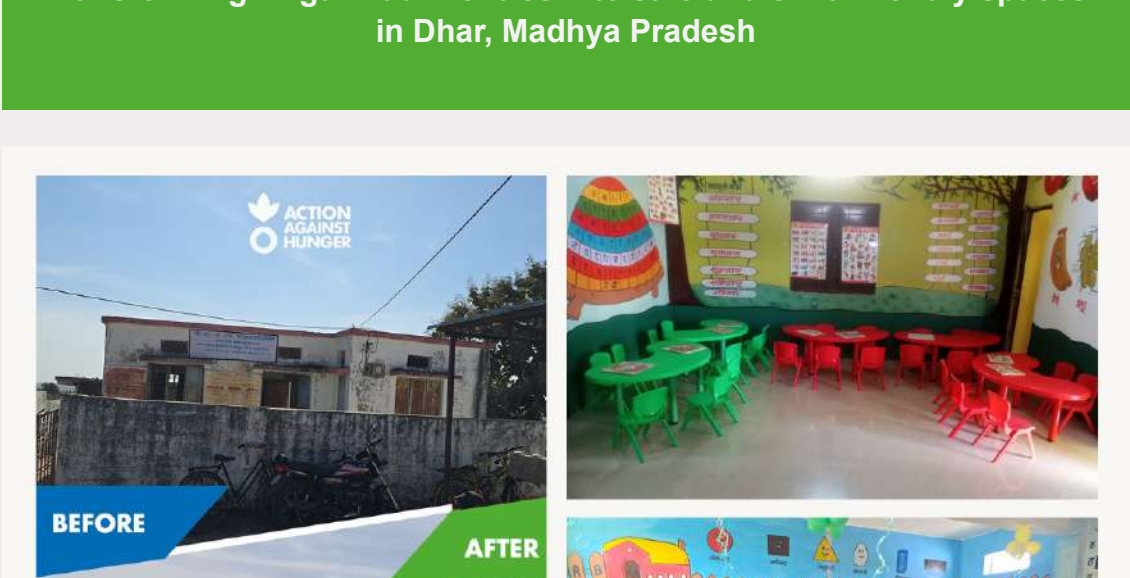

Transforming Anganwadi Centres into safe and child-friendly spaces in Dhar, Madhya Pradesh



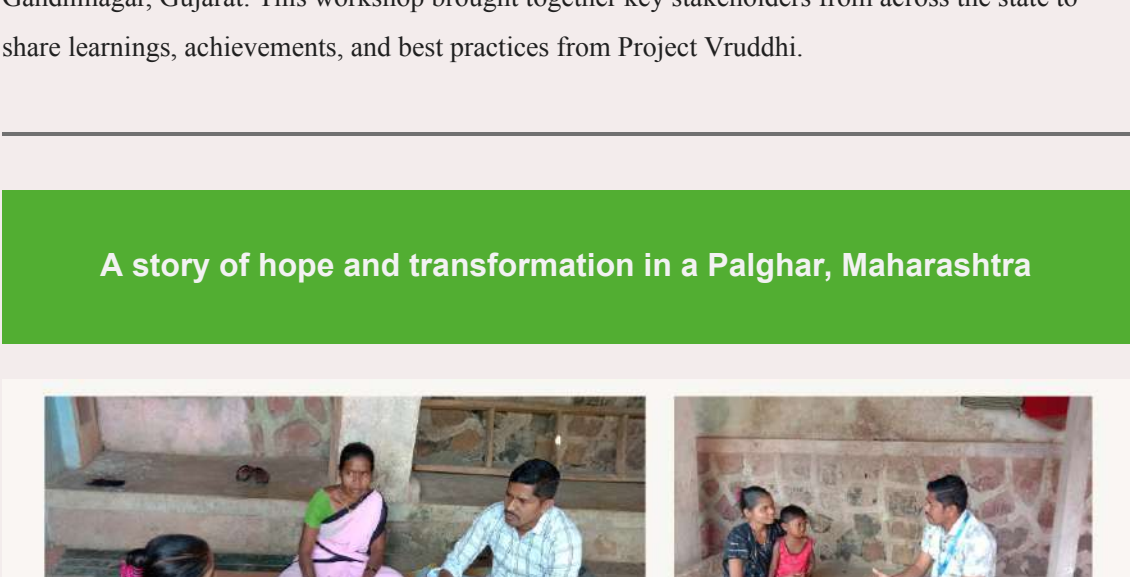

A story of hope and transformation in a Palghar, Maharashtra

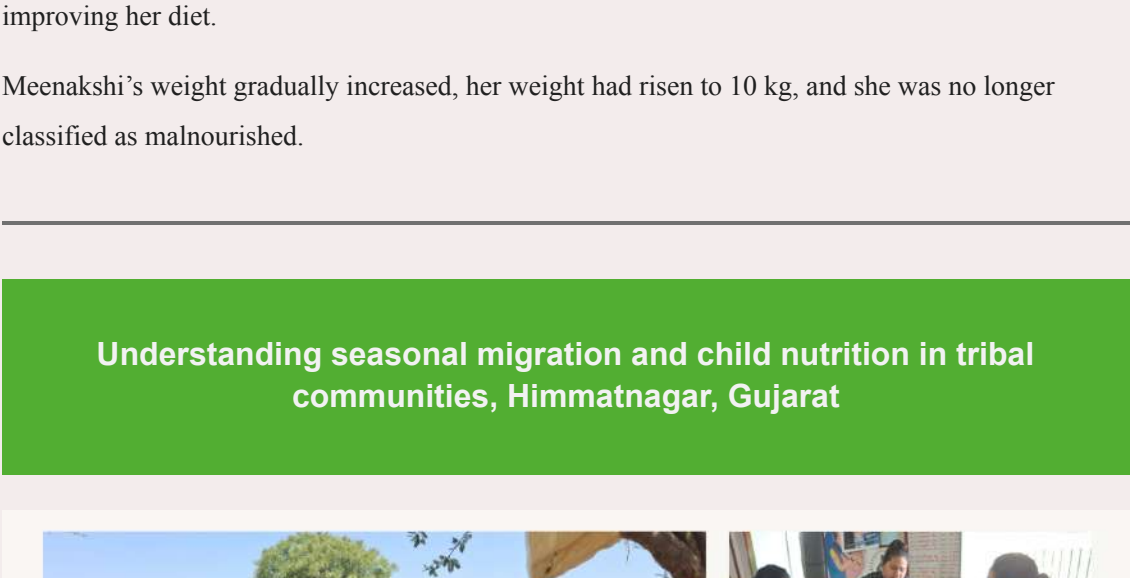


Meenakshi (name changed) Korda, a young girl from Tadachi Machi village in Palghar, struggled with undernutrition due to lack of proper care and breastfeeding. Born with a weight of 2.5 kg, Meenakshi's parents had to migrate for work, leaving her without adequate attention. Over time, her weight decreased, leading her to be classified as moderately malnourished.

Our team intervened, measuring Meenakshi's weight and height and providing vital guidance. Through regular visits, counseling, and nutritional support, Meenakshi's parents were trained in proper nutrition, hygiene, and gardening. This helped provide fresh, home-grown vegetables, improving her diet.


Meenakshi's weight gradually increased, her weight had risen to 10 kg, and she was no longer classified as malnourished.


Understanding seasonal migration and child nutrition in tribal communities, Himmatnagar, Gujarat

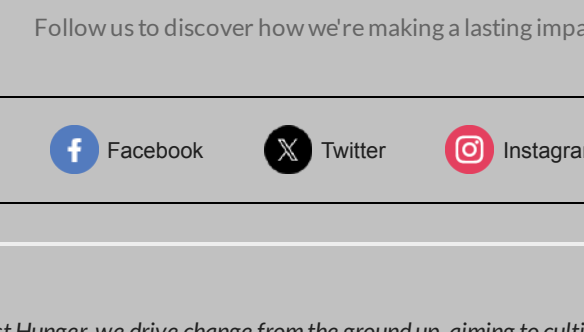


In Himmatnagar, Sabarkantha district, Gujarat, our project focuses on the impact of seasonal migration on the nutrition and health of children under five in tribal communities. By tracking migrating families and identifying high-risk children, we connect them with essential health and nutrition services. Collaborating with Anganwadi workers, local leaders, and labor contractors, we aim to bridge service gaps and support migrant families. Through community visits and data collection, we work towards minimizing the negative effects of migration on child nutrition and developing sustainable solutions to strengthen government programs.
